

What do the lessons involve and do they relate to the school curriculum?

An RAA-trained, qualified teacher will visit your school to deliver an interactive, age-appropriate presentation with a focus on pedestrian, passenger and wheeled safety. We've designed our lessons in conjunction with the Australian Curriculum.

How many lessons can a school have?

Our Street Smart teacher will deliver up to five lessons a day in each school, to a maximum of 30 students per class. Each school can arrange one visit per calendar year. For larger schools, an extra visit can be arranged.

Does the classroom teacher or the school need to prepare anything?

The classroom teacher doesn't need to prepare a thing, our Street Smart teacher will bring all the resources needed.

Once you've made a booking, a Street Smart teacher will arrange a visit to sort out the details for the day.

Why Street Smart?

We all interact with the road network every day, so we need to learn and be reminded about road safety. We can't afford to take it for granted.

RAA, Lifetime Support Authority, Think! Road Safety and the Government of South Australia, believe that road safety is an important life skill that should be taught from an early age. By learning about road safety in primary school, students can start developing the skills and knowledge that will make them safer in the road environment.

Street Smart Primary delivers an interactive, age-appropriate road safety program for primary school students, focusing on pedestrians, passengers and safety on wheels.

The program provides:

- a trained teacher that delivers age-appropriate lessons that are 45 minutes in duration
- an incursion held at your educational facility
- a choice of four age-appropriate lessons for students from Reception through to Year 6
- lessons that can be tailored to suit your school's needs
- advice to schools on delivering appropriate follow-up programs
- information to help parents/caregivers continue road safety learning at home.

The program is offered as a community service and is free of charge.



Pedestrian safety and passenger safety

Level 1 (Reception and Year 1)

Students are introduced to strategies designed to improve their safety in the road environment. As pedestrians, students learn about the importance of being visible to other road users, using pedestrian crossings and using the Stop, Look, Listen, Think strategy when crossing roads. As passengers, students develop their understanding of how to 'buckle-up' safely in the car.

Pedestrian safety and safety on wheels

Level 2 (Years 2 and 3)

Students gain a deeper understanding of the skills needed to cross the road with care. Students develop an awareness of riding wheeled devices safely and wearing protective equipment.

Pedestrian, passenger and wheeled safety

Level 3 (Years 4 and 5)

Students broaden their understanding of possible risks in the road environment. They learn skills to maximise their safety as a pedestrian and when on wheeled devices. Students develop an awareness that their behaviour as a passenger can influence the safety of others in the car.

Becoming a safe road user with increasing independence

Level 4 (Year 6)

Students deepen their understanding of the skills that are required to be a responsible road user and that actions have consequences. Students will learn about the importance of using safety equipment such as helmets and seatbelts correctly, to minimise risk of injury.
